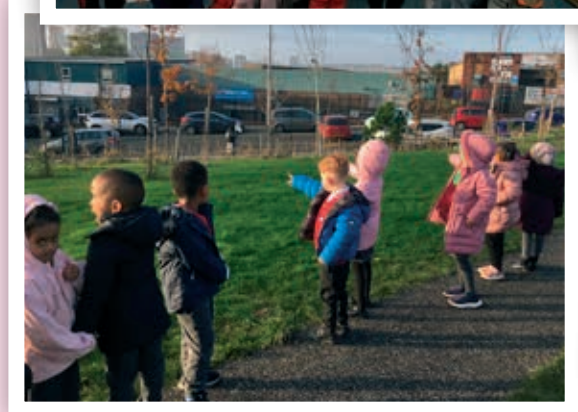
It has been a remarkable year full of challenge, achievement and delight. A super start to school life, RH! You are all incredible!

3OD



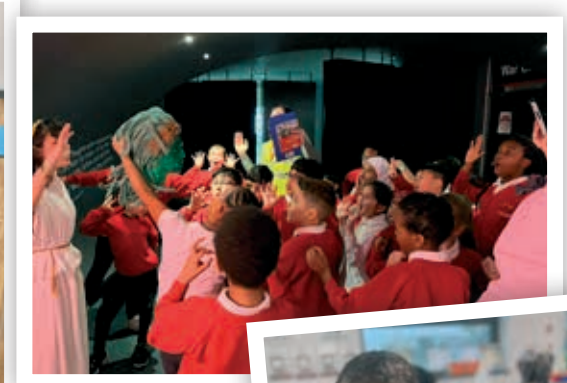

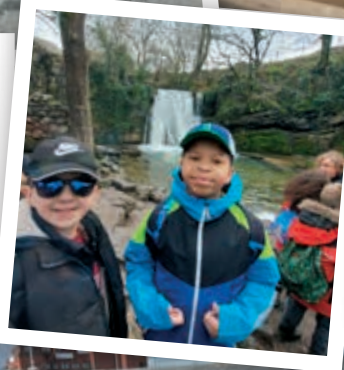

4B

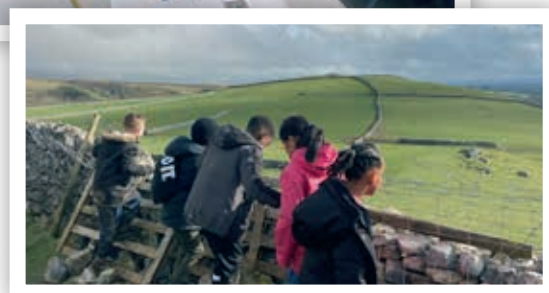
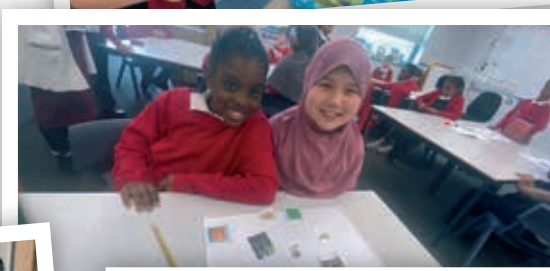
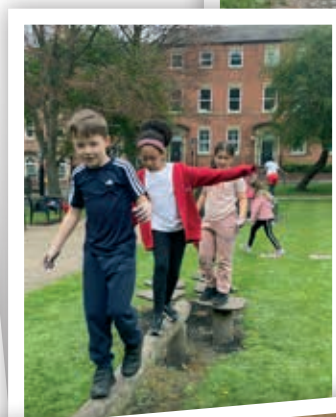
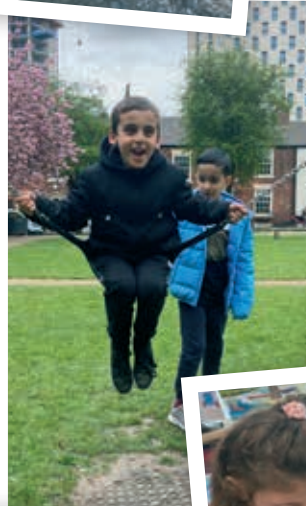

5AB

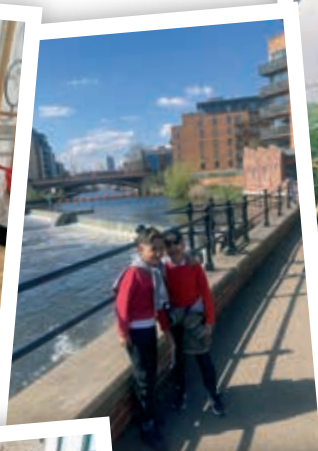

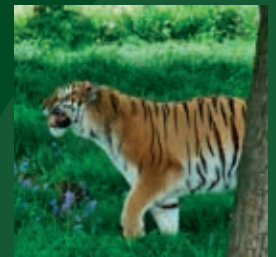
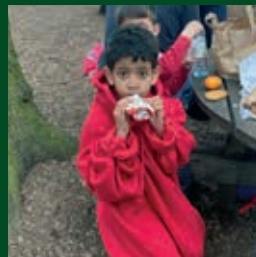


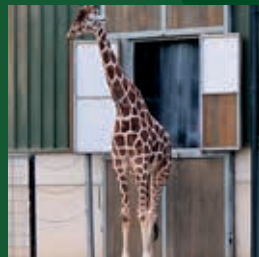


YORKSHIRE WILDLIFE PARK

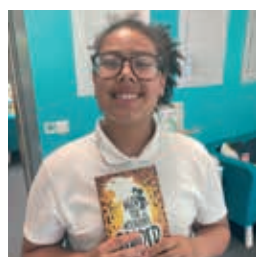
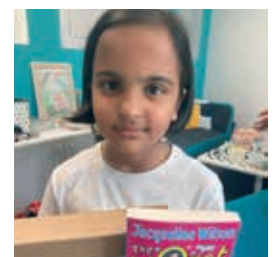
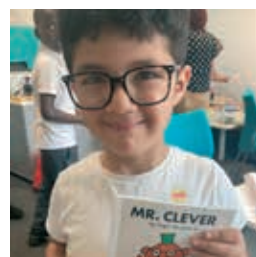
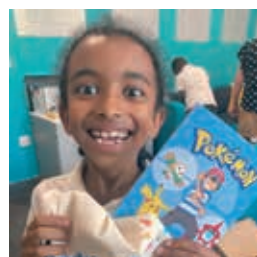
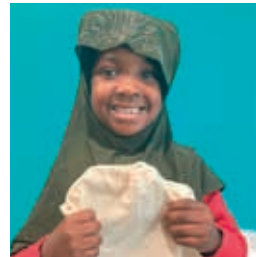


CHRISTMAS 2022
