BEYOND THE SCHOOL GATES

For children to experience a curriculum of excellence from the heart of Leeds, their learning must take them beyond the school gates. As a Leeds school in the heart of the city we want our children to contribute to towards:

- > Building a community where there is respect, understanding and tolerance.
- > Developing connections between communities locally, nationally and globally.
- > A society in which they are active citizens, taking care of the environment and their neighbours who live in it.
- > Making Leeds a safe, clean, green city
- > Improving their own physical and mental well-being by taking an active and informed role in all areas of their personal development.

We seek for all children to develop a sense of place and belonging through a carefully crafted approach to geography fieldwork. This work begins in Nursery with a discovery walk around the school grounds then continues in all year groups. This year, children in Upper Key Stage Two have mapped and followed a city centre street art trail and written to local councillors about how they believe local land use could be changed to better suit the needs of the people of Lincoln Green.

We develop meaningful opportunities to partner with local organisations who share our sense of moral purpose and high aspirations. This year we have worked with Burmantofts Senior Action, Leeds South and East Foodbank, KPMG, Ahead Partnership, Safer Roads Leeds, Leeds Refugee Forum, **Burmantofts Communities Festival** and Cycle North on several projects to ensure all children experience the joy of being a part of a thriving community.

Our strong community partnerships and links with local organisations have allowed us to facilitate Parent ESOL and Maths classes, the HENRY parenting course, ZEST Parent Wellbeing Group as well as half termly Parent Voice and Parent Ambassador meetings and events.

Through Yorkshire Sport's Opening School Facilities Funding we have hosted several school holiday sport camps, weekly after hours community Table Tennis training sessions with PingPong4u and a weekly late night Girl's football club with Umoja Leeds CIC.








































CHOOL ACHIEVEMENT
